As authorized under section 12(l) of the Richard B. Russell National School Lunch Act, <u>42 U.S.C. 1760(l)</u>, FNS may waive provisions of such Act or the Child Nutrition Act of 1966, as amended, and the provisions of this part with respect to a State or eligible service provider. The provisions of this part required by other statutes may not be waived under this authority. FNS may only approve requests for a waiver that are submitted by a State Summer EBT agency and comply with the requirements at section 12(l)(1) and the limitations at section 12(l)(4), including that FNS may not grant a waiver that increases Federal costs.

x	7 CFR 292.12(f)(1)	<i>Income applications.</i> The Summer EBT agency must notify (or place notification in the mail) eligible households of a child's approved status within 15 operational days of receipt of a complete application.

Describe the challenges the Summer EBT agency is seeking to solve with the requested waiver(s), including the goal of the requested waiver(s), the manner in which the requested waiver(s) will improve services in Summer EBT, and the expected outcomes if the waiver(s) are approved:

RESPONSE: North Carolina is facing several challenges that prevent the Summer EBT agency from completing critical implementation activities in time to meet program requirements. These challenges include:

Existing systems in North Carolina do not support this activity and updates and/or new systems are needed.







Describe steps the Summer EBT agency has taken to address barriers at the State level:

RESPONSE: North Carolina will take the following steps to successfully implement these waivers:

- NCDHHS and NCDPI meet on a regular basis to discuss implementation activities and timelines. If approved, we will continue this close collaboration throughout the implementation of this waiver.
- NCDHHS is working with our EBT processor to confirm that all activities can be completed by the revised deadline.
- NCDHHS will train staff on the alternative procedures, if the waiver is approved.

NCDHHS will monitor the implementation of the alternative procedures if the waiver is approved.

Describe anticipated challenges the Summer EBT agency may face if the requested waivers are not approved:

RESPONSE: North Carolina anticipates the following challenges if the requested waivers are not approved:

North Carolina will not be able to effectively issue benefits to all eligible children, and the Summer EBT agency may not have time to accurately identify all children who are eligible for benefits and that children may not receive benefits they are due. The likelihood of issuances made in error, double issuances, or missed individuals would increase substantially, and there would be a considerable strain on state resources.

Describe the expected waiver implementation date and time period:

RESPONSE: The expected waiver implementation date would be May 1, 2024, and would continue until September 30, 2024.

Check to affirm that the waiver(s) will not increase the overall cost of the Summer EBT Program to the Federal Government. If there are anticipated increases, confirm that the costs will be paid from non-Federal funds.
