OPDAAC Skill Building Breakout Session Descriptions

Session #1: Justice-Involved Work at the Local Level

Alison Gunn and MegAnn Smith

This breakout session will provide an overview of justice-involved work being done through collaborations between local health departments and community partners in North Carolina. Panelists will share stories from the field on accomplishments and lessons learned. By the end of the session, participants will be able to identify two counties in North Carolina employing community outreach workers within the jail setting to combat the opioid epidemic and connect incarcerated individuals to care. Participants will learn what factors necessitated this work, day to day operations of each program, and successes and lessons learned associated with each county.

Session #2: Stepping Up Initiative

Bob Kurtz

The sequential intercept model is a way to show how people with behavioral health disorders flow through the criminal justice system. It can also be used as a planning tool to help counties and communities work together to develop strategies to intercept people in the criminal justice system and divert them to treatment. It has recently been used to help communities organize around solutions to address the opioid crisis. Dr. Kurtz will describe the sequential intercept model, sequential intercept mapping, and how your community can arrange for its own sequential intercept mapping event.

Session #3: Jail-based Overdose Education

Melissia Larson

This breakout session will provide an overview of North Carolina Harm Reduction Coalition's jail-based overdose education and naloxone distribution program currently being implemented in three county jails. The presenter will share from their experience in coordinating and implementing the pilot project, as well as accomplishments and lessons learned. By the end of the session, participants will identify three county jails in North Carolina supporting an overdose prevention education and naloxone distribution program, best practices for implementing a jail-based program, and have access to teaching resources and community referrals.
