Trauma Informed Partnering for Safety and Permanence: Model Approach to Partnerships in Parenting (TIPS MAPP)	A 10-week preparation and selection program for prospective foster and adoptive parents. Each component of TIPS-MAPP is designed to assist participants to develop essential skills to promote the safety, wellbeing, and permanence. The curriculum is also designed to assess the prospective foster and adoptive parents' willingness and readiness to assume the role. Curriculum is available in Spanish. Deciding Together	A one-on-one version of preparation and selection program. The curriculum was designed for prospective foster and adoptive parents who are unable to attend the TIPS-MAPP training. Caring For Our Own	A 27-hour support group and training for kinship caregivers to assist with working in partnership with the helping network, the children, and the birth parents of the children. If the kinship provider wants to pursue licensure, an additional 3 hours of training must be completed to meet preservice requirements.	Children's Alliance of Kansas www.childally.org
Pressley Ridge's Treatment Foster Care Pre-Service Curriculum	A curriculum for prospective therapeutic foster parents. The goals of the training are to enhance knowledge and insight regarding treatment foster care, child development, trauma-informed care, and behavior management techniques. Develop parenting skills to assist in working with youth experiencing behavioral and emotional challenges and improve their ability and commitment to succeed in the role of a therapeutic foster parent. PRIDE Model of Practice (Parent Resources for Information, Development, and Education)	A competency-based model of practice designed to strengthen the quality of family foster care and adoption services by developing and supporting foster and adoptive families. The model is based on protecting and nurturing children (safety outcome), meet, and address the development needs (well-being outcome), support relationships between children and their families (permanency outcome), and work as a member of the professional team which is essential to achieve the other four outcomes. CARE (Children and Residential Experiences: Creating Conditions for Change) for Foster Carers	A trauma informed, evidence-based program model provides a set of evidence informed principles that emphasize building developmental relationships, maintaining trauma sensitive environments, and working effectively with biological families. Provides foster parents a framework for care with clear objectives for daily routines, leisure activities, and foster parent/child interactions. This allows the foster parents to focus on helping the children achieve the competencies necessary to manage life events successfully. Without a clear framework for providing care, there are lost opportunities throughout the day to use normal routines, foster parent/child interactions, and recreational activities to help children achieve developmental and treatment goals. A framework for practice based on a valid theory of how children change, grow, and develop that is consistent with the needs of the children, motivates both children and foster parents to adhere to routines, structures, and minimizes the potential for interpersonal conflict.
