




# NCDHHS Seeks Public Input on New Substance Use Disorder Service Definitions Through December 29

### **Public Comment Open Through December 29**

NCDHHS has released **seven proposed State-funded Service Definitions** for Substance Use Disorder (SUD) services as part of ongoing efforts to strengthen access, quality, and outcomes for individuals and families impacted by substance use.


# Now Available: North Carolina Justice Reentry & Recovery Pocket Guides

### **Application Submitted to CMS**

North Carolina has officially submitted its \$200M Rural Health Transformation Plan to CMS. Awards are expected by Dec. 31, 2025.

### **Built with Community Input**

More than 420 stakeholders helped shape the plan, including rural hospitals, health departments, Tribal partners, community organizations and residents.

### **Program Goal**

Ensure people across 85 rural counties have reliable access to high-quality, integrated medical, mental health, substance use and social support services.





# DMH/DD/SUS Supports Youth Empowerment at WYLD Annual Dinner

### November 6, 2025

DMH/DD/SUS participated in the <u>Wilkes Youth Life Development (WYLD)</u> Annual Dinner, where **Jessica Dicken**, Assistant Director for Prevention, delivered the keynote address for this year's theme: "Our WYLD Story: Chapter 4 – Foundation for the Future."

### Highlights:

- Jessica emphasized the importance of prevention, recovery, and community-based programs in strengthening youth resilience and leadership.
- WYLD's Teen Action Council shared powerful testimonies on advocacy, mentorship, and personal growth.
- The event celebrated key milestones, including:
  - Delivery of the 100th bed through the Sweet Dreams of Wilkes initiative
  - Expansion of the <u>Change Wagon</u> "pay as you can" food truck
  - Continued success of youth leadership programs, including <u>Lead Appalachia</u>

New NC Program Supports People with Mental Illness Leaving the Justice System

North Carolina is launching a **\$9.5M pilot program** to help people with serious mental health needs successfully return to their communities after involvement with the justice system.

**FACT (Forensic Assertive Community Treatment) teams** will begin operating in late 2025/early 2026 in:

Pitt, New Hanover, Wake/Durham, Buncombe and Mecklenburg counties.

Teams will provide coordinated support, including:

- Mental health and substance use treatment
- Housing and daily living support
- Job/education assistance

**Providers:** Strategic Interventions, Carolina Outreach and RHA Health Services.



## New Reentry Home Opens in Durham to Support Women After Incarceration

First Lady Anna Stein and DMH/DD/SUS Director Kelly Crosbie joined community partners to celebrate the opening of <u>Jubilee Home for women</u> in Durham. The new home provides safe housing and comprehensive reentry support for women leaving prison or jail.

### **Jubilee Home offers:**

- Stable transitional housing for up to four women
- Mental health and substance use support
- Employment and life-skills assistance
- On-site Peer Navigators with lived justice-system experience

Jubilee Home is **one of 11 organizations** awarded NCDHHS funding to support justice-involved individuals with mental health or substance use needs.
