#### **Upcoming Events:**

- Durham CFAC will be participating in the Recovery Community of Durham's "Durham Celebrated Recovery" that will take place on September 8th from 2 to 6 pm at Durham Central Park.
- Wake CFAC will be participating at RCNC Recovery Rally, on October 7th.
- The Johnston County Opioid Task Force, which Alliance is part of in Johnston County, is co-hosting an important training on how to recognize and react to an overdose on Wednesday September 26 at 6 o'clock at Hocutt-Ellington Memorial Library in Clayton.
- Alliance also has created a new website to help raise awareness about the opioid crisis. (https://allianceforaction.org/). The site also provides information and resources for all stakeholders, from the individual to healthcare professionals, about how to help address the crisis.
- Alliance announced on Monday that they have entered into a partnership with
  Mallinckrodt Pharmaceuticals to make 30,000 drug deactivation pouches available
  across the four counties that Alliance serves. The pouches will allow individuals to
  safely dispose of expired or unneeded medications, especially opioid pain medications
  and narcotics, at home to prevent misuse, abuse and addiction. Each pouch can hold
  up to 45 pills, which means if each pouch is used to maximum capacity, it would get rid
  of 1,350,000 unused, unneeded pills. The full story is published on Alliance's website.

#### **VAYA – Susan Jenkins**

- Recruiting is going well for Vaya CFAC. There have been several new applicants over the summer, including some individuals who have lived experience with substance use disorders.
- Vaya CFAC will hold its annual retreat in October in Asheville. Steering Committee is working on the agenda. We plan to invite Vaya and state leadership to attend.
- Vaya CFAC is reviewing and providing feedback on a tip sheet called "FACTS About Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT)." The person-centered planning brochure we have been working on is in its final draft form and will be finalized for distribution soon.
- Fourth Annual Western Regional Recovery Rally takes place September 8 from 10 a.m. 2 p.m. at the *Open Air Gym* at Lake Junaluska. Everyone is invited!
- Vaya is offering several trainings in the coming weeks. Check vayahealth.com's calendar
  of events for information about Wellness Recovery Action Plan (WRAP), Peer Support
  Specialist training, System of Care Child and Family Teams, and Adult and Youth Mental
  Health First Aid classes.
- The Caiyalynn Burrell Child Crisis Center is now open in Asheville. The 16-bed facility serves youth ages 6 through 17 who need crisis stabilization services and 24-hour supervision due to a mental health crisis, substance use, or withdrawal from drugs or alcohol. It also provides crisis care to individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities. The center is named in memory of a 12-year-old Asheville girl who died in 2014 after taking a lethal amount of medication. Her family believes she may have accidentally overdosed in a 'cry for help' due to bullying at school and on social media.
