Subject: Federal Outcome Measures Report

The Federal Outcome Measures report detailing data from January 1, 2005 to December 31, 2005 is now available. The report for your county is attached. The statewide Federal Outcome Measures are reported to the federal government as part of the Child and Family Services Review (CFSR) process, in addition to the on-site review of individual cases. The federal government has created six national data standards and benchmarks that states must meet in order to be in substantial conformity on the CFSR. The six data elements are as follows:

In addition to the six national data standards, the Federal Outcomes Measures report also shows the percentage of children under age 12 in group homes for each county. Although this percentage is not reported to the federal government as part of the CFSR process, it is a number that Congress asks for each year as part of its report from the Children's Bureau. Please note that we found an error in the formula that we used to calculate the percentage of children twelve and under in group care for the last reporting period, so you will see some changes in this percentage. Further, we would like to clarify that children in maternity homes are not counted as part of this statistic.

You will receive a copy of the Federal Outcomes Report for your county quarterly. Each report consists of five columns. The first column names the data standard, the second column lists the federal benchmark, the third column shows North Carolina's performance on the measure, the fourth column shows your level counties' performance, and the fifth column details your individual counties' performance. Eventually, we hope to post this data on a county-by-county basis on the Division's website. We will notify you as soon as this is available. In the mean time, counties can access each other's data through XPTR report "PQA 182 Outcomes Measures".

The Division hopes that the Federal Outcomes Report will be helpful to you. This information can be used to update your staff and the community concerning your progress on ensuring the safety, permanence and well-being of the children in your county and in the state.
