District Permanency Collaboratives Brief History

In 2015, a Federal review of North Carolina child welfare practices indicated the need to improve the permanency outcomes for children through collaboration with the judicial system by:

- 1. Developing with NCAOC and other judicial system partners a plan to engage local court and DSS to address issues of:
 - Notice to resource parents
 - Timely establishment of case goals
 - Concurrent planning
 - Permanency
 - Timely TPR actions

District Permanency Collaboratives Brief History, *continued*

2. NC DSS, Indigent Defense Services, Guardian ad Litem and the Court Improvement Program to provide targeted engagement to county department of social services and court personnel in judicial districts and counties across the state to support children achieving permanency and stability in their living situations.

RESULT:

Creation of District Permanency Collaboratives and the Permanency Performance Profile

Summer 2020 Survey & DPC Benefits

- Conducting District Permanency Collaboratives: 25 Districts
- Not conducting District Permanency Collaboratives: 15 Districts
- No survey response from 2 districts

Benefits of DPC meeting:

- Create uniformity within the District. Look at data from each county in the District and get on the same page with practice.
- Shared Vision: Opportunity for counties within a District to connect with DSS staff and agency and parent attorneys.
- Opportunity to work with DJJ to assess children coming into care from Delinquency Court.
- A place to share and assess strategies in reference to the court calendar and needs.
- Meetings have created more collaboration with the Clerks of Court to assure continuances are recorded correctly.
- Frequent communication has resulted in better utilization of court time.
- DPCs are a space to review Family Court Rules to determine how to make changes and create permanency sooner.
- "Nice to have dedicated time to explore permanency goals"

District Permanency Collaboratives **Objectives: Goals & Benefits**

- Hold quarterly meetings with local Judges, Attorneys, Guardian ad Litem and Child Welfare leaders and other stakeholders as needed
- Discuss permanency data (Permanency Performance Profile) and plans for improving permanency
- Build collaboration amongst stakeholders and work together to increase safe and timely permanent exits from foster care
- Improve a data-driven partnership between the Child Welfare and Judiciary

District Permanency Collaboratives Process and Expectations for Meetings

- **Gather** local judicial and child welfare leadership and other stakeholders as needed. *Identify a district point person or people.*
- **Review and update** the Permanency Performance Profile data; discuss successes and barriers to safe and timely permanence.
- **Discuss other items** in your district as it relates to safe and timely permanence (i.e., relationship building amongst stakeholders, update local court rules, collaboration with clerks of court, review court calendar).
- **Record meeting notes** on the designated *Quarterly Documentation Tool* template.
- Agenda, meeting notes and updated Permanency Performance Profile (with JWise data) emailed within five (5) business days after the meeting to: DPCMaterials@dhhs.nc.gov.

District Permanency Collaboratives **Objectives: Feedback Loop**

- Local Meeting Agenda, Meeting Notes and Permanency Performance Profiles are submitted to NC-DSS and summary information is reviewed with NC-DSS and NCAOC Leadership.
- Each quarter, the Summary Report will be shared with Counties / Districts on key learnings from the meetings across the state:
 - Districts who had a Collaborative meeting
 - Successes
 - Barriers
 - Questions on data, process, etc.
 - Other items as needed
- NCDSS and NCAOC will troubleshoot and provide technical assistance to local jurisdictions as needed

District Permanency Collaboratives **CIP Measures – JWISE Reports**

- 1: Time to First Permanency Hearing (CIP 1)
- 2: Time to Subsequent Permanency Hearings (CIP 2)
- 3: Time to Permanent Placement (CIP 3)
- 4: Time to Termination of Parental Rights Petition (CIP 4)
- 5: Time to Termination of Parental Rights Order Entered (CIP 5)

District Permanency Collaboratives Measures and Data Sources: JWise

There are three NC Key Time Standard Reports, which are based on the statutory standards for each of these hearings:

- 1. Adjudication hearings report
- 2. Disposition hearings report
- 3. First Permanency Planning Hearing report
- On-demand reports are generated by the user for a specific date range.
- Reports generate overnight; requested reports will be available the next day (allow 24 hours).
- All petition-based reports will be generated in both PDF and Excel formats.

To keep JWise running optimally, only request up to one year of data at a time and submit the requests at the end of the day.
