Overview of CIE

What is CIE and who does it include?

The Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) defines **Competitive Integrated Employment** as individuals with disabilities who perform work on a full-time or part-time basis and are:

- 1 Compensated at or above minimum wage
- Paid comparable wages to employees without disabilities performing similar duties and with similar training and experience
- Receiving the same level of benefits provided to employees without disabilities in similar positions
- At a location where employees with disabilities interact with individuals without disabilities
- Presented opportunities for advancement similar to other employees without disabilities in similar positions



Individuals with disabilities can access a variety of supports and services to build the skills and experience to succeed in a CIE environment

Creating a "meaningful week" for each person includes services that **help individuals find and maintain employment** and resources to **improve confidence and promote independence**.

After an individual qualifies for VR services, there are potential Supported Employment services available

Vocational Rehabilitation Services

VR services help individuals with a disability develop a customized path to employment that includes:

- Career counseling
- Education and training
- Job placement assistance
- Medical treatments
- Assistive technology

For **eligibility requirements**, individuals can contact their local VR office for a referral.

Services and supports can help individuals with I/DD overcome perceived barriers and achieve success in CIE

Potential barriers to pursing employment may include assumptions about required skills or abilities to:

- Read, write, or perform math
- Make complex decisions or problem-solve
- Manage time
- Perform executive functioning (attention and memory; self-regulation)
- Establish and/or maintain interpersonal relationships
- Express or receive communication
- Perform fine or gross motor skills

Examples of services offered to support individuals with disabilities pursue employment

An individual with an intellectual disability who has never worked received:

- A vocational evaluation to identify jobs matching his strengths and interests.
- Job Search Assistance
- Job Coaching

A person with Cerebral Palsy received:

- Assistive Technology evaluation and technology
- · Drivers Evaluation and vehicle modifications
- Post Secondary Training

An individual with I/DD wanted a different job and received:

- · Counseling on options to advance in employment
- · Short term training to build marketable skills
- Training on job seeking skills

Inclusion Works Initiative

NCDHHS's divisions DHB, DVR, and DMH/DD/SAS collaborate to promote CIE for individuals with disabilities through the Inclusion Works Initiative

NC Department of Health and Human Services

Overarching agency that is responsible for the health, safety, and well-being of North Carolina residents, and is committed to prioritizing the most vulnerable populations like individuals with I/DD.

Division of Vocational Rehabilitation

VR services help eligible job seekers develop a customized path to employment that includes the training and support needed to compete in NC's workforce.




Division of Health Benefits

Oversees and manages Medicaid in the state of NC, which provides health care to eligible low-income adults, children, seniors, and people with disabilities. Recent Medicaid Expansion has led to 600,000 newly eligible North Carolinians to receive Medicaid, including individuals with I/DD.

Division of Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities and Substance Use Services

Support individuals with mental illness, developmental disabilities, and substance use disorders access resources and services to support living in the community like job training, residential support, and day programs.

Inclusion Works launches partnership with Work Together NC to expand and enhance the services to support individuals with disabilities obtain CIE

WTNC's goal is to help individuals with I/DD transition to adulthood and increase access to meaningful work, community engagement, and continued education.


They will also be partnering with WISE and Triangle Disability and Autism Services to support the mission of Inclusion Works.



What is on the Horizon

In 2024, Inclusion Works will continue its partnership to help individuals with disabilities in North Carolina to find and maintain jobs in their community

Inclusion Works will target four areas to implement new practices across the state and expand Supported Employment services



Strategic Planning and Stakeholder Engagement

- Monthly meetings with advisory committee
- Perform a landscape assessment
- Implement a new Strategic Plan

Employment Assessments and Career Development Plans

- Refine current tools and processes
- Conduct assessments with individuals in non-integrated settings
- Train provider staff and care managers

Provider Innovation Initiative

- Develop trainings for Provider Innovation, Customized Employment, and Self Employment
- Create a Learning Collaborative

Data Collection and Reporting

- Collect data to understand the current employment landscape in NC
- Publish reports to track the progress of the initiative
