

NC MIECHV

Adolescent Parenting Program Average caseload: 15-25 per home visitor

Eligibility Pregnant or parenting adolescents (13-19)

- Enrolled in school or GED completion program
- All Adolescent Parenting Programs (AP2) use PAT curriculum for home visiting. Many programs are
- PAT Affiliates the rest are program subscribers.

Attachment Biobehavioral Catch-Up Average caseload: Varies according to program

funding and community needs; a full caseload would be 10-12 families seen weekly Eligibility

- Children ages 6-24 months (for ABC-Infant model)

- or 24-48 months (for ABC-Toddler model) and their caregivers are eligible for the model. -Although any child in these age ranges is eligible,
- ABC's research evidence is particularly strong for children who have experienced early relationship adversity, such as early separation (e.g., hospitalization, living with an alternate caregiver such as a grandparent or foster parent), domestic violence, or parental mental health and/or substance

Average caseload: 20-22 families per team Eligibility

- Women of childbearing age who were enrolled or eligible for enrollment in the Pregnancy Care
- Management Program. - Women and children are enrolled up to 6 months postpartum and receive services until the child is two vears of age.

BookBabies

Average caseload: 100 families per FT Book Babies Coach

Eligibility

- Babies are enrolled prenatally up until 16 weeks of age
- Babies need to be Medicaid eligible
- Families need to reside within county limits

Child First Average caseload: 8-16 families per team

Eligibility - Child is under 6 years of age at the time of referral to Child First

- Child has active NC Medicaid

-Child has developmental, behavioral, emotional concerns or has been exposed to trauma

Early Head Start Home Visiting Average caseload: 10-12 families per team

Eligibility Pregnant women and children from birth to age three who are from families with incomes

- below the poverty guidelines are eligible for Early Head Start services Children from homeless families, and families
- receiving public assistance such as TANF or SSI are also eligible. Foster children are eligible regardless of their foster family's income.

Family Connects (includes ICO4MCH) Average caseload: Population Level

Eligibility Available for all births

Healthy Beginnings

Average caseload: 40

- Eligibility Minority women and their children from birth to age two
- No more than 20% can be enrolled during the 60-day postpartum period

Healthy Families America (includes MIECHV)

Average caseload: 12-30 families, depending on service level Eligibility

Eligibility occurs either prenatally or within the first two weeks after the birth of the baby

eligible regardless of risk factors

- Parents determined at risk using a systematic

screening tool or Parent Survey Assessment

Healthy Families America (continued)

Average caseload: Population Level Eligibility

HIPPY

- 2-5 years of age

Nurse-Family Partnership (includes MIECHV) Average caseload: At least 25 first-time mothers

per Nurse Home Visitor

Eligibility First-time mothers enrolled before 28 weeks gestation

Family must meet low-income criteria Families enrolled until the child turns 2

High Risk (teen pregnancy, unemployment, maternal health risks, poverty, unstable housing, limited support, etc.)

Parents as Teachers (includes AP2) Average caseload: 18 - 30 families based on the

frequency of visits Eligibility

- PAT is designed to be used in any community
 - Enrollment beginning prenatally and continues until the child enters school.
- Some affiliates target specific populations or families with >1 high need characteristic

ParentChild+

Average caseload: 12-14 per specialist Eligibility

- children ages 16 to 48 months

SafeCare

Average caseload: maximum range 12-15

families Eligibility

- birth to 5
