North Carolina to Apply for the Rural Health Transformation Program

The North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services announced it will begin preparing to submit its application to receive funding from the Rural Health Transformation Program (RHTP). The program is part of H.R. 1, a federal bill signed into law by President Trump in July to address rural health concerns due to federal cuts to the Medicaid program. NCDHHS has created a website with a link for providers to give feedback on what should be considered for North Carolina's application. NCDHHS will host several opportunities for partner organizations to provide input for the state's RHTP application in the coming months. Read the full Press release here.

Request for Applications - Strong Minds, Strong Communities: Expanding Mental Health Access

The NCDHHS Division of Mental Health. Developmental Disabilities and Substance Use Services in partnership with the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, is seeking applications from qualified community-based organizations across North Carolina. Become an implementation site for the "Strong Minds, Strong Communities" mental health intervention and help expand access to culturally competent, evidence-based mental health care for underserved populations. Selected organizations can receive up to \$166,950 in year one funding to recruit, hire and manage a team of Community Health Workers (CHWs) and a licensed clinical supervisor. This is an opportunity to expand your organization's mental health programming, grow the CHW workforce and significantly increase access to culturally competent, evidence-based mental health care for underserved populations, especially racial/ethnic and linguistic minority groups, and those in rural areas.

Through this program, CHWs are trained in mental health knowledge and skills. Strong Minds equips CHWs with essential tools such as cognitive behavioral therapy exercises, motivational interviewing and mindfulness techniques. This training aims to enhance mental health access in marginalized communities by empowering CHWs to deliver effective, evidence-based

On June 25, 2025, the NC Office of Rural Health participated in the inaugural session of the Pamlico County Health and Wellness Conference Series, hosted at the new Pamlico County Library in Bayboro. Sponsored by the local nonprofit Imagine Pamlico, the series brought together local leadership, health care providers, and state and academic partners to build a shared vision for a healthier, more resilient rural future.

The June 25 convening focused on assessing current health services, identifying gaps, and laying the foundation for an integrated community-centered health and wellness model. Sessions throughout the day included insights from state and local experts such as Dr. Sharon Stephenson, Dr. Diana Silimperi, Lynn Hardison, RN, and Dr. Eugene Elliott. ORH was represented by Dr. Sebastian Gimenez, who also conducted a Telehealth Infrastructure Grant (TIG) site visit with the Pamlico County Health Department, a current ORH grantee. The Hope Clinic, another Pamlicobased TIG grantee, was highlighted during discussions as a model for innovative community-based care.

Dr. Gimenez contributed to the discussions by sharing success stories from the TIG program and recent economic analysis showing the potential local impact of expanding specialty services within the county. As cited in a recent New Bern Sun Journal article, the broader goal of the series is to design a locally grounded, scalable model for wellness in rural eastern North Carolina.

The journey concluded with a site visit to the Pamlico County Health Department, where ORH staff reviewed the department's progress under the TIG program.

Black River Health Services and Manos Unidas Relaunch Mobile Outreach



Black River Health Services and their farmworker health program, Manos Unidas, successfully relaunched their medical mobile unit outreach program in June 2025. This was made possible through their partnership with Novant Health and the leadership of Dr. Bailey Minish and Manos Unidas' Outreach Director David Gasca. The mobile unit is additionally supported by the bilingual farmworker health outreach team and a volunteer nurse. Novant has provided the unit and driver time. The unit has gone out once per month since launching with plans to increase frequency. The team has reached farmworker camps and patients in Sampson, Bladen and Pender counties thus far. The Rural Hospital Program administers two federal grants on behalf of Small Rural and Critical Access Hospitals (CAHs) called the Rural Medicare Flexibility Program, or Flex, and the Small Rural Hospital Improvement Program (SHIP). These grants help small rural and critical access hospitals improve their viability, quality of services and integration with the rest of the health care system. Hospitals are crucial for our rural communities, and those communities include many individuals and organizations that are connected to the hospitals. Many connected organizations are served by ORH, like our State Designated Rural Health Centers, CMS Rural Health Clinics and Community Health Grantees.

Thus a number of staff from teams across ORH, in partnership with the North Carolina Healthcare Foundation, traveled to Angel Medical Center in Franklin, Bertie Cooperative Extension in Windsor and Campbell University in Lillington for our regional meetings. The meetings covered upcoming policy changes, quality in health care, workforce development and wholeperson care. Bringing together traditional health care partners with community members allowed each region to see what resources and connections they have available in order to ensure they can work together to deliver the best possible care. Renew NC is North Carolina's long-term disaster recovery effort, committed to rebuilding impacted communities stronger so they are more resilient to future storms. The Renew NC Single-Family Housing Program is a centralized housing rehabilitation, reconstruction or replacement program that will prioritize low-to-moderate income families with seniors aged 62 and older, children and/or disabled household members impacted by Hurricane Helene. The program has received at least 750 applications since its announcement.

The Surry County Office of Substance Abuse Recovery (SCOSAR) will offer a free 60-hour certification training to prepare community members as Recovery Coach Professionals, through an online program beginning in August and running into October.

The training is a collaboration between the county office, Recovery Friendly Workplace Program and Piedmont Triad Workforce Development Board.
