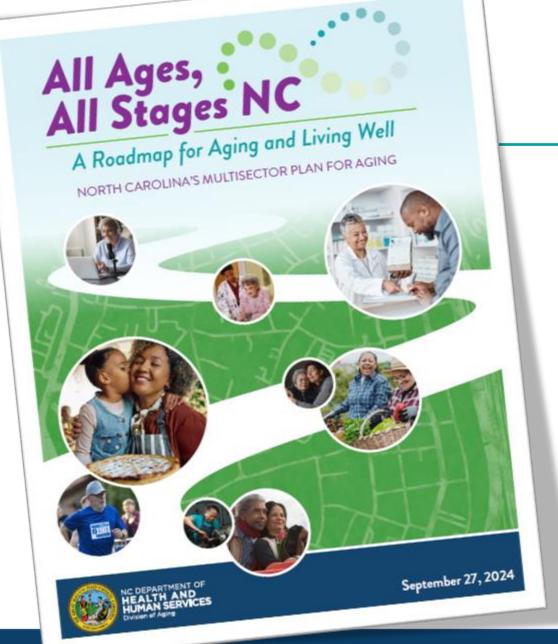

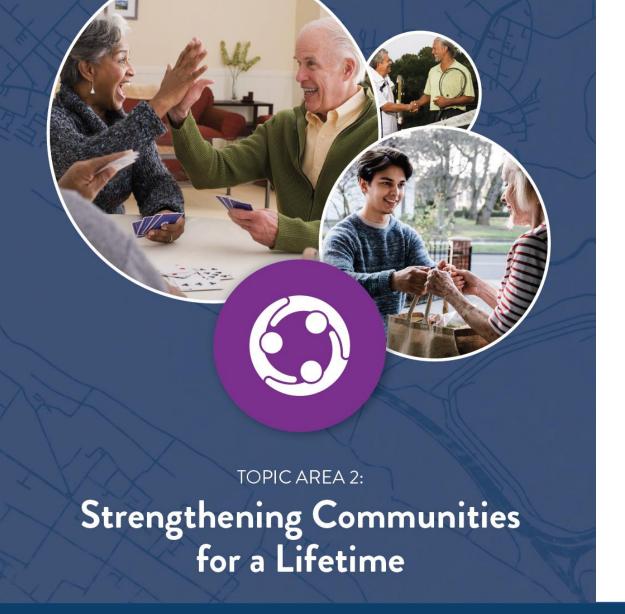

Subgroup Highlights: Implementation in Action



3 Subgroups and 9 Recommendations

1. Subgroup 1: Housing (Housing Priority)

- 1.Increase access to and sustainability of affordable housing.
- 2. Encourage adoption of universal design principles.
- 3. Ensure evolving housing needs of aging individuals with disabilities

2. Subgroup 2: Digital Equity (Age-Friendly State and Communities Priority)

- 1. Reduce social isolation and improve connectivity.
- 2.Enhance digital equity for older adults.

3. Subgroup 3: Social Determinants of Health (SDOH) / Age-Friendly (Age-Friendly State and Communities Priority)

- 1. Promote innovative transportation options.
- 2. Address food insecurity barriers.
- 3.Increase training on fraud, scams, and consumer protection to reduce the risk of exploitation.
- 4. Support Age-Friendly community designations.





Housing Subgroup Updates

 - Address expanding affordable housing, promoting universal design, and meeting the needs of individuals aging with disabilities, while aligning with state housing plans and legislative efforts.

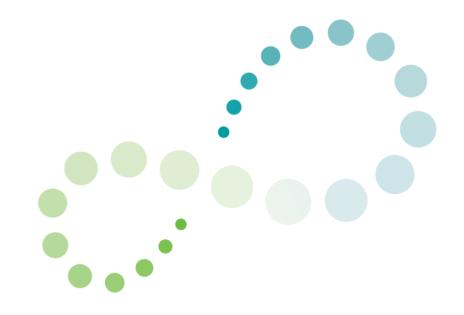

The Optimizing Health and Well-being workgroup focuses on ensuring North Carolinians have access to person-centered services that improve both life

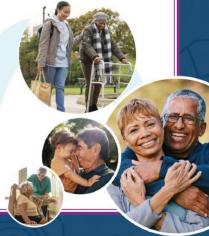
expectancy and quality of life.

In the 2024 report, Investing in North Carolina's
Caregiving Workforce, NC DHHS and the NC
Department of Commerce observed that "North
Carolina lacks reliable and actionable data
surrounding its direct care workforce." In this session,
Kezia Scales of PHI and Trish Farnham of the NC

data can inform NC's strategy to support the direct
care workforce and key considerations as NC works
to improve its data landscape. The session will begin
